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- NRCS Status Update “Looking Forward”. Streamlining the NRCS programs and processes, local working groups implementing targeted conservation projects, looking forward under the EQIP here in Colorado, Chief Bettencourt is asking us to limit our funding to five pools.
- Hunter Cleaveland: **Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)**
 - Signups in Fiscal Year 2025, Colorado is still leading the nation in application acres and acres enrolled in the program. All CRP signups must be completed by September 30th. FY2025 Annual Rental Payments are set to be batched in October.
 - Expected dates for Grazing have been approved, amendments have been drafted and issued and added to our CRP Handbook for Colorado. All field offices and county offices have been notified they are authorized.
- Jim Cecil requested FSA Colorado consider allowing haying as a potential mid-contract management practice. Several participants spoke regarding this request. Clint Evans will work with FSA to establish a CRP Subcommittee to discuss the haying request and other CRP specific requests. 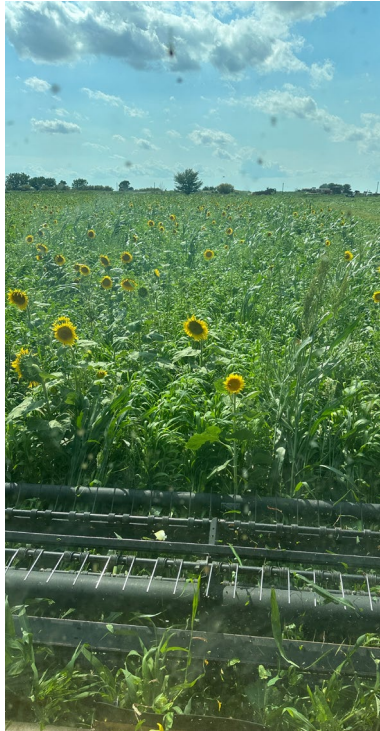

ALE Grasslands

“Grassland of special environmental significance (GSS)” means grasslands that contain little or no noxious or invasive species, as designated or defined by State or Federal law; are subject to the threat of conversion to nongrassland uses or fragmentation; and the land—

(i) Is rangeland, pastureland, shrubland, or wet meadows on which the vegetation is dominated by native grasses, grass-like plants, shrubs, or forbs, or

(ii) Is improved, naturalized pastureland, rangeland, or wet meadows;

(iii) Provides, or could provide, habitat for threatened or endangered species or at-risk species,

(iv) Protects sensitive or declining native prairie or grassland types or grasslands buffering wetlands, or

(v) Provides protection of highly sensitive natural resources as identified by the State conservationist, in consultation with the State technical committee.

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MERGENCY WATERSHED PROTECTION PROGRAM (EWP)

■ EWP OBJECTIVE

RCS administers federal assistance on **state, tribal, and private lands** to relieve imminent hazards to life and property. Not on Federal land.

EWP can be initiated when there is a **sudden impairment** of a watershed.

Watershed impairment exists when the ability of a watershed to carry out its **natural functions is reduced**.

EMERGENCY WATERSHED PROTECTION PROGRAM (EWP)

■ EWP GOALS

Reduce erosion

Reduce sedimentation

Reduce the threat of damage from future flooding

EWP IMPLEMENTATION PROCESS



ELECTRONIC DISASTER REPORT (EDR)

- NRCS completes as the disaster occurs and unfolds.
- Acts as heads up to NRCS NHQ in Washington DC.

EWP SPONSOR

request assistance from NRCS within **60 days** of the natural disaster occurrence/access

project sponsor is a unit of State or local government, or a state agency, or a Native American Tribe or Tribal organization.

■ **Sponsor Must**

Have a legal interest in, or responsibility for, the areas threatened by a watershed emergency.

Be capable of obtaining landowner permissions and required permits.

EWP SPONSOR

■ **Sponsor Must**

Be capable of ensuring operation and maintenance (O&M) is performed.

Accept requests for assistance from landowners.

Administer technical services and construction contracts

Provide the required local share of construction costs (Usually 25%)

EWP DAMAGE SURVEY REPORT (DSR)

RCS & Sponsor assess the potential for present & future damage.

SR's must be completed within **60 days** of the sponsor's request.

WP proposed recovery measures **MUST BE** feasible for the following:

EWP DAMAGE SURVEY REPORT (DSR)

Economically: Benefits > than Costs

Environmentally: T&E, Cultural Resources

Socially: Acceptable by the community

Technically: Meets NRCS Standards & Specifications

LOCALLY LED AGREEMENT

between NRCS & The Sponsor
Period of Performance is **220 days**

WFP is **not a grant program** it's a cooperative agreement
between the federal government and the sponsor
The sponsor must have the **capacity** to implement and
administer their required responsibilities.

LOCALLY LED AGREEMENT

Construction dollars are classified as Financial Assistance (A).

RCS cost share rate for construction is usually **75%**.

Sponsor share of construction costs, usually **25%**.

RCS will provide Technical Assistance (TA) funds for the administration of the agreement.

A is reimbursed at 100%.

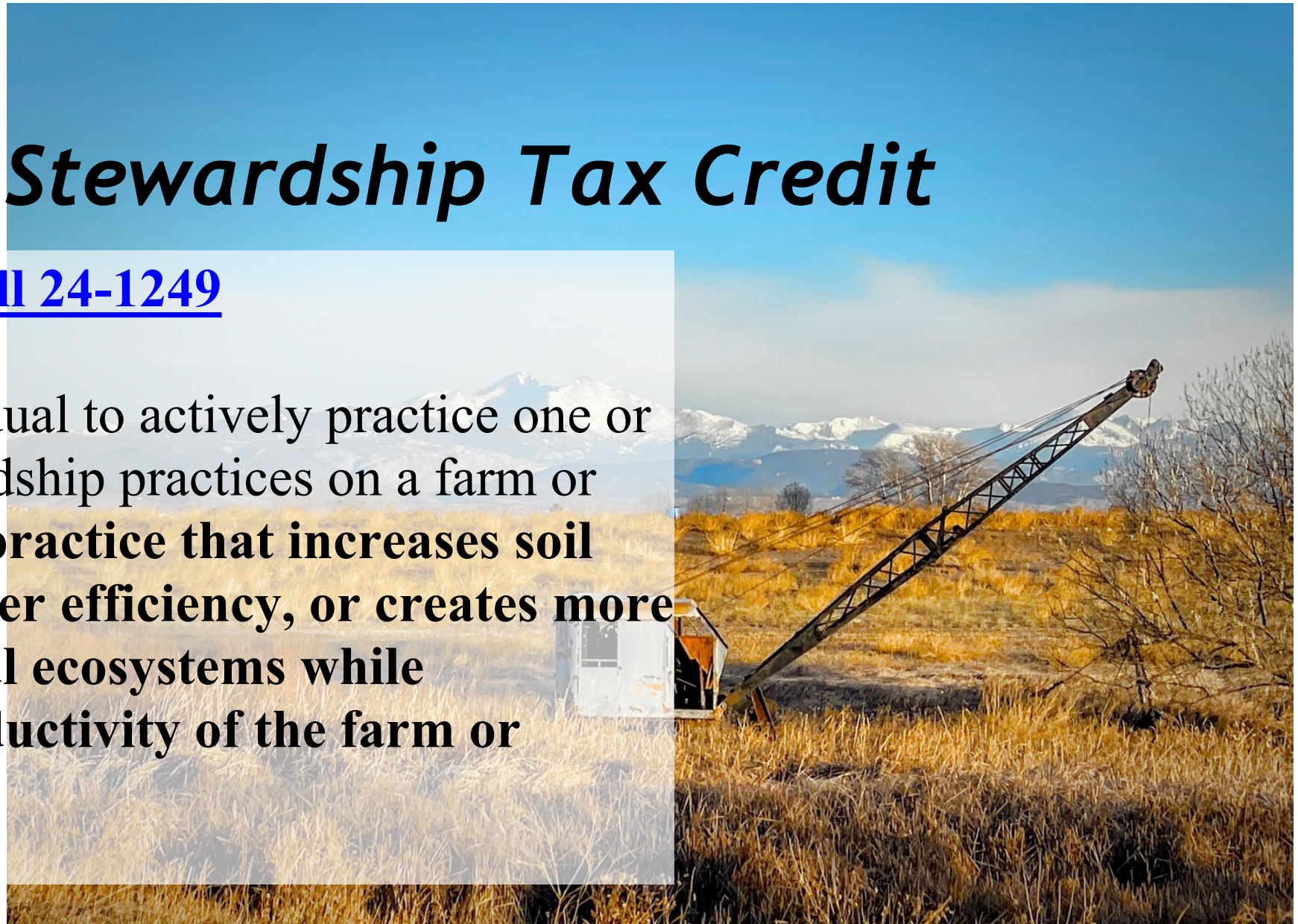

Encourage an individual to actively practice one or more qualified stewardship practices on a farm or ranch, including **any practice that increases soil health, improves water efficiency, or creates more diverse and beneficial ecosystems while maintaining the productivity of the farm or ranch.**”

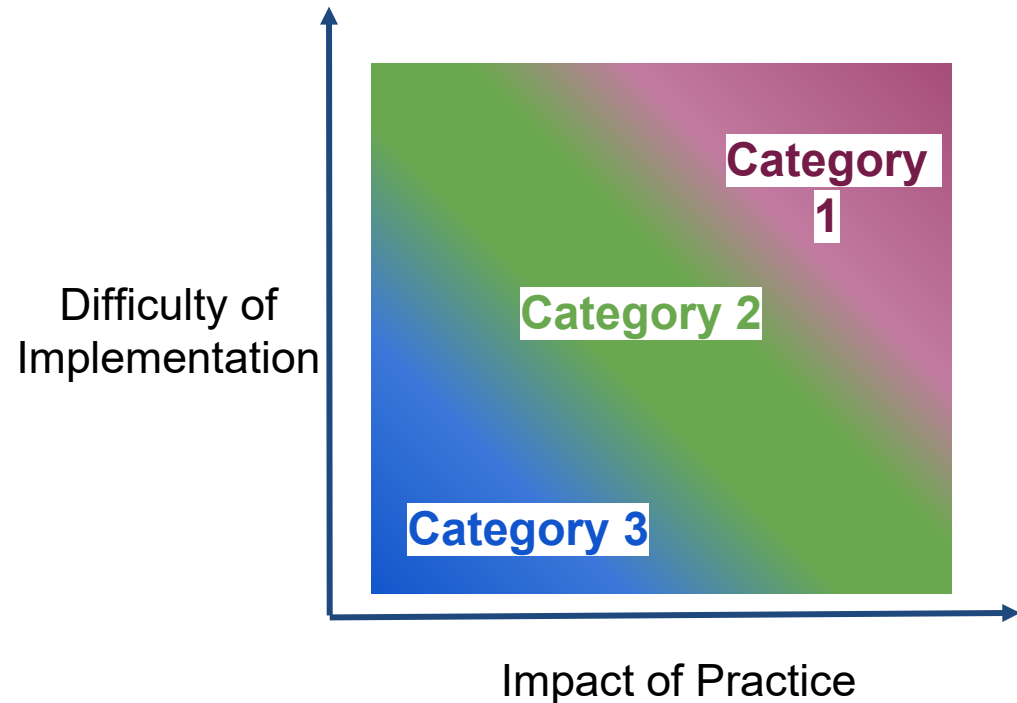
Credit Structure - Scaled by Acreage & Category

Different practices have varying degrees of difficulty to implement and also impact.

Smaller farms have a hard time benefiting from flat dollar/acre programs.

There is also an economies of scale benefit for implementing practices over many acreages.

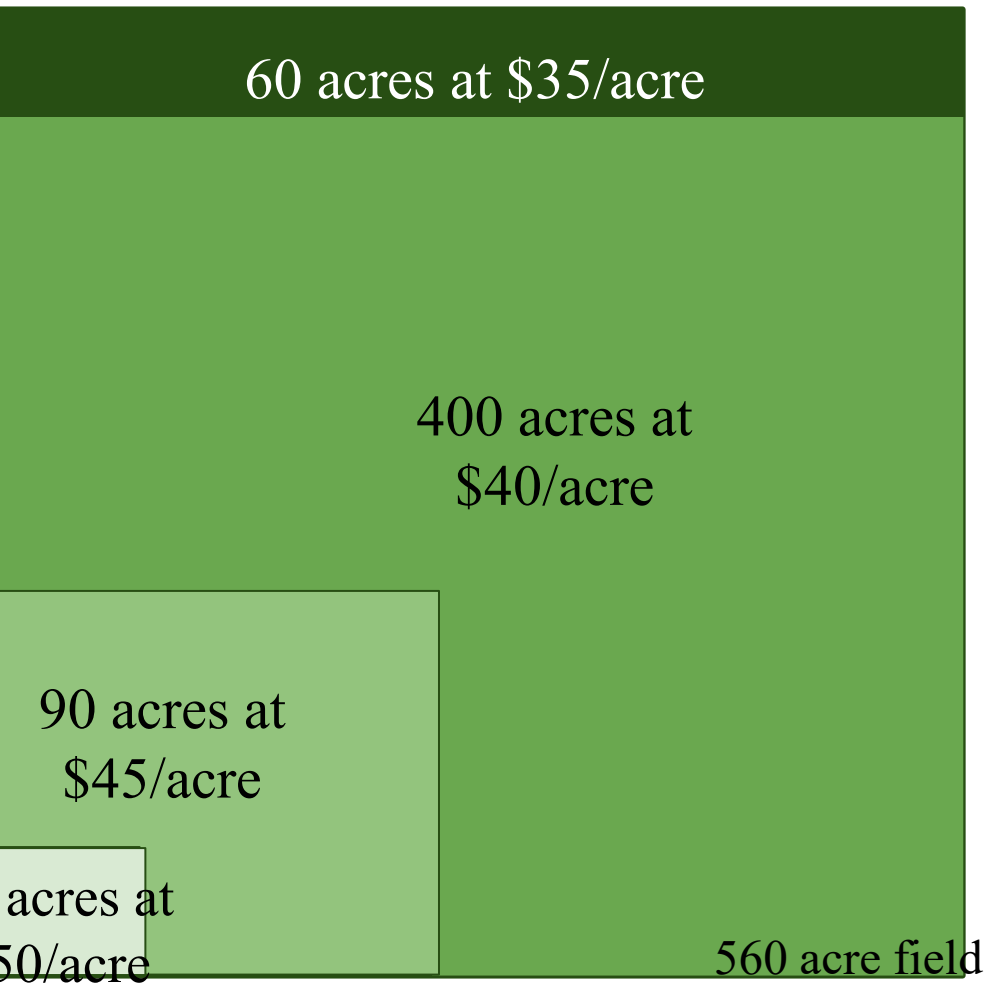

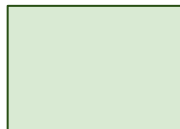
Example. A producer implements one Category 1 practice on 560 Acres



They will earn a set rate for each acreage tier
(first 10 acres, 11-100, 101-500, >500):

$$\begin{aligned} & 10 \text{ acres at } \$50/\text{acre} \\ + & 90 \text{ acres at } \$45/\text{acre} \text{ (100 acres total)} \\ + & 400 \text{ acres at } \$40/\text{acre} \text{ (500 acres total)} \\ + & 60 \text{ acres at } \$35/\text{acre} \text{ (560 acres total)} \end{aligned}$$

\$ 22,650.00 (\$40/acre)

 = 10 Acres



Credit Structure - Combining Practices

Qualified Stewardship Practice definition includes practices that cannot be combined or stacked.

Multiple combined practices are implemented, the producer will be eligible to receive the combined amounts (based on the practice category and acreage completed on).

However, compensation will not be able to exceed the maximums laid out in legislation (\$150,000 for 1 practice, \$200,000 for 2 practices, \$300,000 for 3 practices)

Credit Amt = Award for 1st practice + Award for 2nd practice + Award for 3rd Practice



Application Process

Oct 2025. Jane reviews requirements on CDA's website, selects required documents. Plans to apply compost and grow cover crops on 200 acres

Nov 2025. Application opens, Jane submits application



Dec 2025 / Jan 2026. CDA reviews complete application, sends Jane a Notice of Completeness, and instructions on how to send in verification information



October 2026. Jane plants cover crops.



March 2026. Jane applies compost, and collects information needed for verification



Nov 2026. Jane submits all required verification documents for 2 practices



Nov 2026. CDA staff visits Jane's farm, verifies practices, and gives Jane a tax credit certificate.



April 15, 2027. Jane submits CO tax return, including tax certificate.



Verification Process

Verification requirements will vary by practice and will include a combination of these methods:

- Soil and Materials Testing
- Receipts
- Site Visits from CDA Staff
- Time-Stamped & Geotagged Photos/Videos
- Detailed Systems Plan/Records

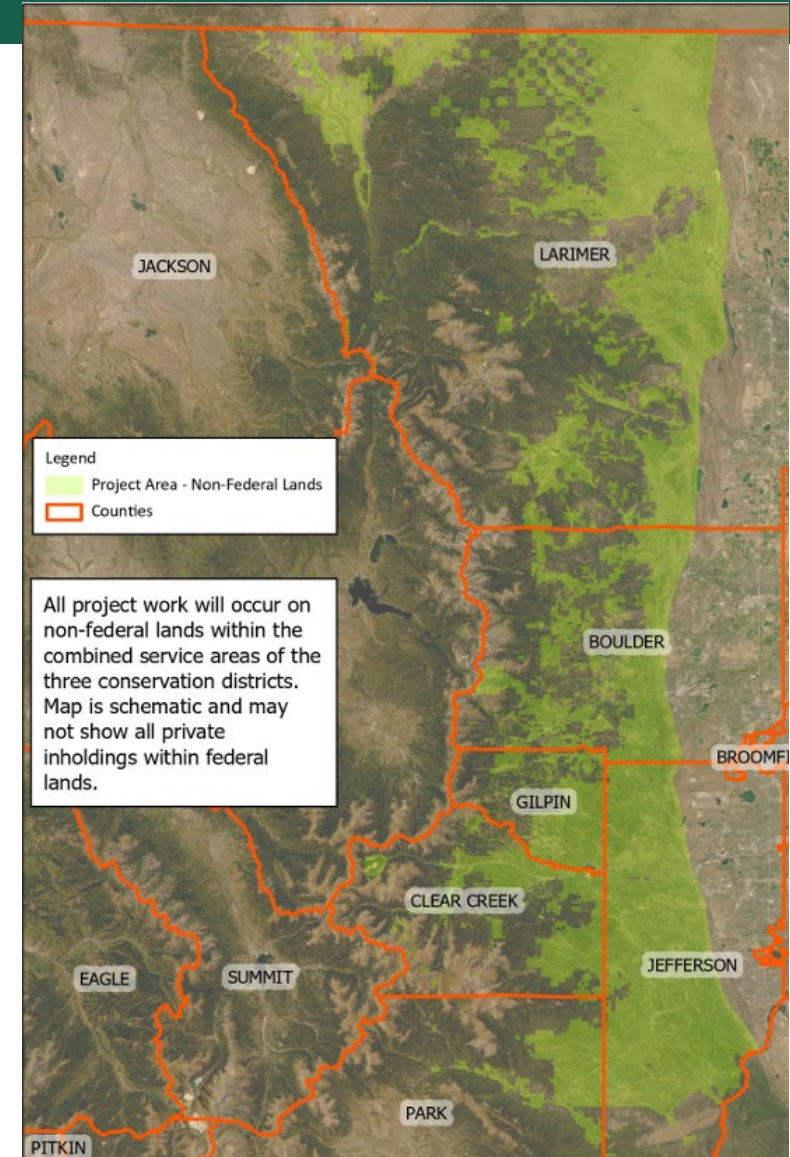

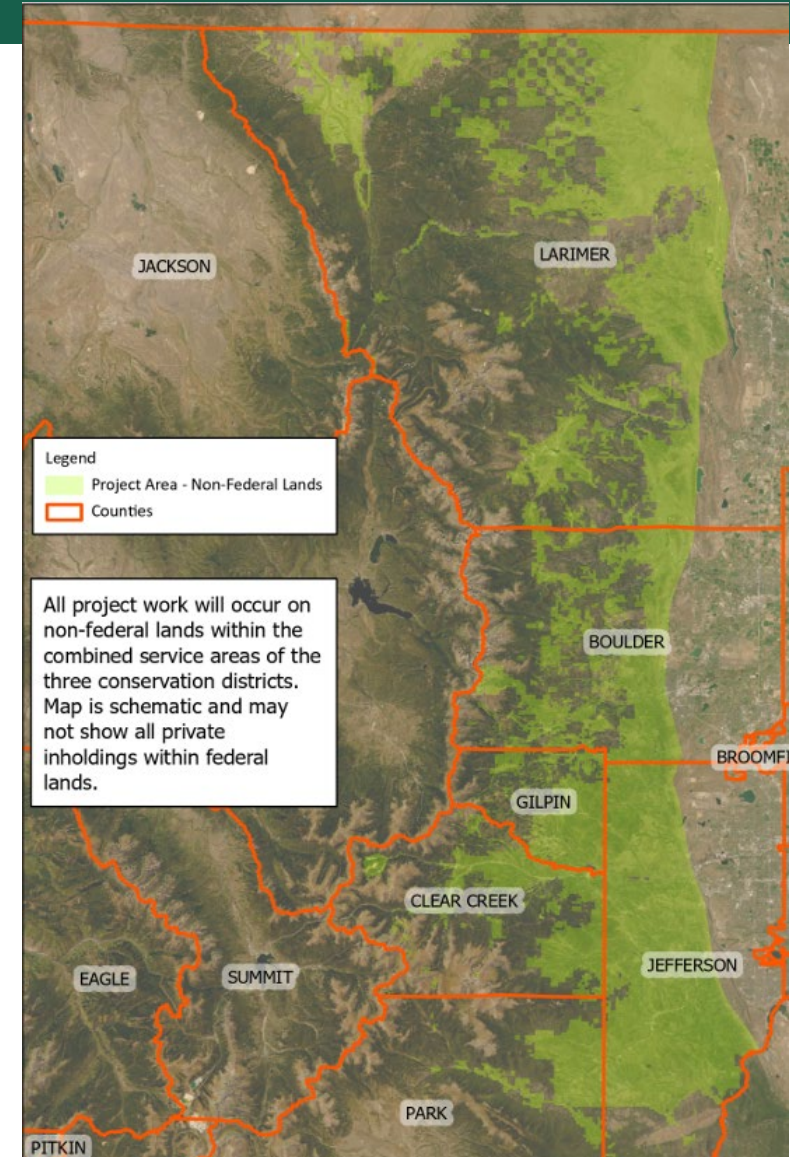
