

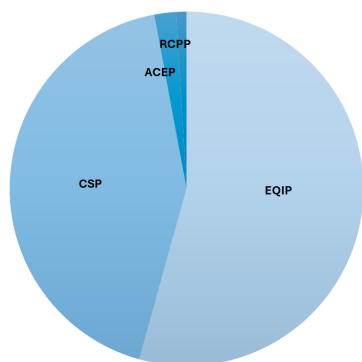

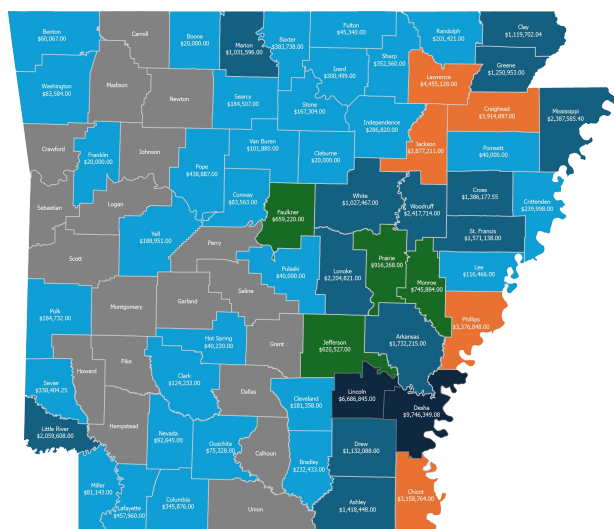
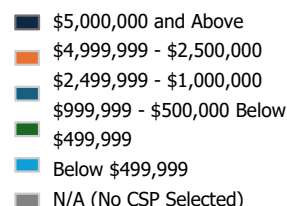
CSP Allocation Highlights - In FY25, Arkansas NRCS allocated Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) contract(s) in nearly every county across the state, highlighting the strong commitment of Arkansas producers and farmers. With the participation of almost every county in Arkansas, CSP has become a shared success story across our agricultural communities— proof that conservation and productivity can grow together. Through CSP, we partner directly with producers to co-develop tailored conservation plans that build on the great work already underway, while introducing new practices and activities aligned with each operation's goals. After NRCS assesses the operation, applications are ranked to reflect national, state, and local resource priorities, ensuring that the highest-scoring applications receive contract offers first. CSP contracts typically span five years. As the nation's largest conservation program for working lands, CSP continues to attract thousands of voluntary participants who recognize its benefits for natural resources— like soil health, water quality, and wildlife habitat—as well as the long-term success and resilience of their businesses.

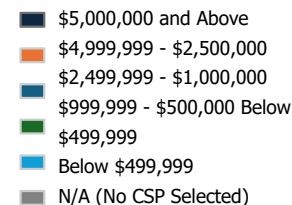
CSP Obligations FY25
